Archaeologists tell us the first residents of what is now known as Nashville were the Mississippi Indians. The first European visitors to the area were French fur traders, who arrived around 1720. The first English settlers ventured here in 1779. In 1796 Tennessee became the 16th state in the union, and Nashville was its capital. In the 1930's, Nashville began playing a new song and the 1950's were the real heyday

of country music. By 1960 the city was earning a reputation as the center of the country, pop, and blues recording industries and became known as the Music City.

Nashville is a vibrant city. It is the home of Fortune 500 companies, National Football League's Tennessee Titans and the National Hockey League's Nashville Predators. Nashville's growing arts community has gained national recognition, but the city will always be the home of country music.

City Center, in 2006, developers didn't fully realize the implications of the construction on a Nashville Electric Service substation that had to be relocated. Without talking to NES, the developers expected relocation costs to total around \$1 million. Five years later, NES is finishing work on a \$57.6 million project to relocate and redesign the downtown substation as well as its transmission and distribution lines.

Begin the day with a tour of Belle Meade Plantation, the "Queen of the Tennessee Plantations". This fully restored Greek Revival mansion was completed in 1853. The grounds include a large carriage house, stable, log cabin, winery and other original buildings.



A tour at Belmont Mansion will follow. It was built in 1850. Belmont was the summer home of Adelicia Acklen, one the wealthiest women in the United States in the mid-19th century. An ornate



Italianate design, the home features many of the original furnishings and includes marble fountains, cast-iron gazebos, and statuary that are still standing as evidence of ornate, formal gardens.

Lunch will be served in the Belmont Mansion Grand Salon, a room designed for entertaining in opulent southern style, as it was in the mid 1800's.

No trip to Nashville would be complete without experiencing the phenomenon of the world famous Grand Ole Opry. You will get a rare glimpse of what happens behind the scenes of country music's most famous show as well as learn the fascinating story of the Grand Ole Opry.

this famous establishment. In between stops you will enjoy a stop at the Gaylord Opryland, a must see in Nashville.



Lunch will be at the family owned Ellendale's Restaurant, nestled in the original Purity Dairy farm house which was erected in 1885. The final stop will be at the world famous Ryman Auditorium, one of Nashville's

signature historical country music landmarks which was home to the Grand Ole Opry at one time.
